HOW TO.... Become a greyhound attendant

A Greyhound Attendant registration allows you to handle greyhounds at race meetings or trials, and act as a catcher at race meetings. To apply for registration:

1. Read the Being a Greyhound Attendant Handbook.
2. Complete the online Registration Knowledge Test.
3. Download your certificate of completion.
4. Visit www.gwic.nsw.gov.au/registration to complete your application online or download a printable form.

What do you love the most about greyhound racing?

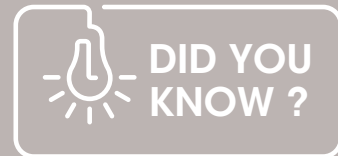
Being able to be involved in every stage of their lives and watch them achieve every small milestone along the way and just being able to watch them do what they love.

Code of Practice - Biosecurity

Section 5 of The Greyhound Welfare Code of Practice outlines the expectations for cleanliness, hygiene and the prevention of spreadable diseases.

The most common infectious outbreaks are Kennel Cough and Gastroenteritis, which can lead to scratching of greyhounds and cancellation of races, resulting in loss of income. Puppies and older, retired greyhounds, are especially at risk of more serious illness and even death.

Greyhound trainers, breeders and owners have a role in almost every aspect of biosecurity including:

- Surveillance
- Isolation and quarantine
- Cleaning and disinfection
- Protection of greyhounds that may be at risk
