Greyhound Rehoming Policy



Purpose	 The purpose of this Policy is to: maximise opportunities for rehoming greyhounds that are retired from, or otherwise unsuitable for, racing; eliminate unnecessary euthanasia of healthy greyhounds; and, ensure that, where it is necessary to euthanase a greyhound, euthanasia is conducted in a humane manner.
	This Policy applies to all greyhound racing industry participants registered with the Greyhound Welfare & Integrity Commission ("the Commission"),
Scope	and to all greyhounds owned or kept by a greyhound racing industry participant.
	This Policy also applies to greyhound racing industry participants licensed in other jurisdictions and operating in NSW.

Breach	A failure to comply with the terms of this Policy may result in disciplinary action under the <i>Greyhound Racing Act</i> 2017.
Policy	
1. Policy principles	• Participants are responsible for rehoming any greyhounds that they do not wish to retain.
	• Greyhounds which are retired from, or otherwise unsuitable for, racing should wherever possible have the opportunity to live out their natural life as a companion animal.
2. Preparation for rehoming	A greyhound that has ceased racing or training for racing must be provided with a ' wind down' period of at least 30 days before being rehomed. During this wind down period, the owner must ensure that:
	 the greyhound's diet is adjusted to suit new levels of exercise;
	 the greyhound's exercise is adjusted to levels appropriate for a companion animal;

		 the greyhound is moved to different housing, either in an outdoor pen or to within a family residence;
		 the greyhound is walked for at least 20 minutes daily in public, while muzzled and on a lead;
		 the greyhound is exposed to new environments such as dog parks/shopping areas and interaction with other dogs (not greyhounds);
		 the greyhound is exposed to different surfaces and a variety of people in a non-training or racing setting;
		 the greyhound is exposed to daily periods of isolation from other dogs and humans, starting with 30 minutes and gradually increasing to three to four hours in duration.
3.	Monitoring greyhounds in preparation for rehoming	Participants must monitor greyhounds being introduced to new environments, people or animals. If the greyhound shows signs of fear or predatory or aggressive behaviour the interaction must be terminated.
	Tenoming	Participants must seek advice from a veterinarian or animal behaviourist if the greyhound being prepared for rehoming shows excessive fear, aggressive or predatory behaviours towards people, small dogs and/or other animals.
4.	Requirement to desex	Greyhounds must be desexed prior to being rehomed as a companion animal.
	greyhound	Participants may be able to access financial assistance from GRNSW to have their greyhounds desexed through the Homing Assistance Scheme.
5.	Rehoming requirements	A greyhound owner must make genuine attempts to rehome any greyhound that they do not wish to retain. If an owner is unable to rehome the greyhound privately, they must first seek the greyhound's admission to the Greyhounds As Pets (GAP) program. If the greyhound is not admitted to the GAP program, the owner must then:
		 seek to rehome the greyhound through at least one other pet rescue or rehoming organisation; or
		• seek the greyhound's admission to the GAP program a second time.
6.	Exceptions to rehoming	The minimum rehoming requirements referred to in clause 5 do not apply in the following circumstances:
	requirements	 where a greyhound has already been rehomed. For example, if a greyhound is rehomed privately, the rehoming requirements have been met and the owner simply needs to provide a completed Retirement Notification form to the Commission; or,

	euthanasia	A greyhound may be euthanased where a veterinarian certifies that the greyhound is suffering from an intractable condition or injury that causes significant pain or discomfort or a marked reduction in quality of life, such that it is inhumane or would otherwise compromise the welfare of the

9.	Euthanasia	Euthanasia of a greyhound must be performed by a veterinarian using humane methods, unless in an emergency as detailed in clause 11 of this Policy.

8.	Restrictions on	Participants must not transfer a greyhound to a person who is under the
		The owner of a greyhound being rehomed as a companion animal must advise the greyhound's new owner of their obligation to register the greyhound as a companion animal in accordance with the requirements of the <i>Companion Animals Act 1998</i> and, for this purpose, direct them to the NSW Pet Registry at <u>https://www.petregistry.nsw.gov.au/#/</u> .

		• where a greyhound is legally required to be euthanased under a court order, or has been declared a dangerous or menacing dog under section 34 of the <i>Companion Animals Act 1998</i> .

	Notification of intent to euthanase a greyhound
	Where a greyhound is not suffering from an intractable condition or injury that causes significant pain or discomfort or a marked reduction in quality of life, the owner must comply with minimum rehoming standards specified in clause 5 of this Policy before considering euthanasia. If the owner intends to have the greyhound euthanased, they must notify the Commission of this intention at least 10 business days before the greyhound is euthanased, by lodging a completed Intent to Euthanase Greyhound Notification form.
11. Euthanasia performed by a	Euthanasia of a greyhound may be performed by a person who is not a veterinarian only in an emergency where the euthanasia is:
person other than a	 necessary to relieve the animal's suffering, and
veterinarian in an emergency	 a veterinarian is unable to attend in a timely manner, or transporting the animal to a veterinarian would unreasonably prolong the animal's suffering, and
	 only after a veterinarian has been consulted.
12. Notification requirements	Rehoming Where a greyhound is rehomed to a person or organisation which is not an industry participant (including GAP), the relinquishing owner must, within 10 days of the greyhound leaving their care, notify the Commission by lodging a completed Retirement Notification form.
	Euthanasia following unsuccessful attempts to rehome Where an owner of a greyhound has complied with the rehoming requirements in clauses 5 and 6, and the owner intends to have the greyhound euthanased, the owner must, at least 10 business days before the greyhound is to be euthanased, notify the Commission of their intention by lodging a completed Intent to Euthanase Greyhound Notification form.
	If the greyhound is euthanased following the notification period, the owner must also notify the Commission by lodging a completed Euthanasia of Greyhound by Vet Notification form.
	Euthanasia Where a greyhound is euthanased by a veterinarian due to illness or injury as per clause 10, the owner must lodge with the Commission a completed Euthanasia of Greyhound Notification by Vet form, within 2 days of the euthanasia being performed.
	Euthanasia performed by a person other than a veterinarian in an
	emergency Where a greyhound is euthanased by someone other than a veterinarian in an emergency situation, the owner must, within 2 days of the euthanasia being performed, lodge with the Commission a completed Emergency Euthanasia of Greyhound – Not by Vet Notification form.
